Week 21

Representing Development

This class will explore contemporary questions of representation and development intervention. Jarosz's article deftly historicizes and contextualizes dominant ways of seeing and doing development in Africa, while Richey and Ponte draw particular attention to the ways in which the development industry attempts to enrol new publics through "causumerism" and celebrity endorsements.
