- Critically analyse how far Derek Gregory's idea of the 'colonial present' is helpful to understand contemporary geopolitics.
- 2. How far do you agree with the assertion that Sir Halford Mackinder's 'Pivot of History' had little relevance when first made and has even less today.
- 'The formation of the Bretton Woods Institutions was prompted by demands for economic stability and only later became justified by a contribution to development.' Critically discuss this statement.
- 4. Critically assess George Kennan's concept of 'containment' as a framework to understand the Cold War.
- According to Naomi Klein (2007), neoliberalism has introduced an era of 'Disaster Capitalism'. Consider how far you agree and outline the implications for development and geopolitics.
- 6. With reference to examples consider how far you agree with Abrahamsen (2001) that "the main effect of the [good governance] discourse is to construct structural adjustment as a force for democracy".
- 7. The 'war on drugs' is as much about the shortcomings of development as it is about geopolitics. Discuss.
- 8. Critically examine the argument that transnational youth gangs represent a viable security threat for the twenty-first century.
- 9. Drawing upon the writing of James Ferguson, show how the object of development is constructed and suggest why this matters.

(note: new set of questions)

- In light of events post 9/11, to what extent can we agree with Samuel Huntington that contemporary conflicts are determined by "civilizational fault-lines" (1997: 41)?
- 2. Evaluate how far Mackinder's <u>The Geographical Pivot of History</u> fulfilled his claim to present a 'world view'.
- 3. 'During The Cold War, 'development' became a marker of a country's loyalty or threat.' Discuss.
- 4. Critically assess the argument that 'good governance' is the solution to corruption in the developing world.
- Using examples, outline the causes and effects of everyday violence on development.
- 6. 'If most ideas promoting Development have been too hopeful, then most Post Development critiques have been too pessimistic.' Discuss.
- 'Western representations of 'underdeveloped' people and places tell us more about those doing the representing than those who are represented.' Discuss with reference to examples.
- 8. Critically evaluate the extent to which civil society actors represent progressive change in countries of the South.
- Using AT LEAST TWO examples, indicate the contribution of Critical Geopolitics to our understanding of contemporary security concerns.


